


Legislation

- Idaho Code Title 39 Chapter 1
- HB406 in 2014 amended Idaho Code 39-175
 - Directs agency to seek program primacy



IPDES Primacy – HB 406

- √ 1. House 62-0-8 January 31, 2014
- ✓ 2. Senate 35-0-0 February 28, 2014
- √3. Governor March 7, 2014
- √4. Trailer Bill March 26, 2014
- √ 5. Added CWA Civil and Criminal violations
- √6. Removes ESA consultation
- √7. Submit Application by Sept 1, 2016
- √8. MOU w/ Other Agencies
- √ 9. Authority to Adopt Reasonable Fees

Benefits of Primacy for Idaho

- Idaho becomes responsible for all aspects of water quality protection
- Idaho controls interpretation of water quality standards
- Seamless integration of various water quality programs
 - Grants & Loans
 - Wastewater Rules
 - TMDL Allocations
- Streamlined permitting process

Negotiated rulemaking

- 8 rulemaking meetings Dec
 2014 thru July 2015
- New chapter of Administrative Rules
- Rule chapter adopted Nov 18, 2015
- Rules approved by 2016
 Legislature (eff. 3/24/2016)



Current NPDES process in Idaho

- EPA drafts permit and sends to DEQ for certification
 - DEQ provides draft 401 certification
 - Concurrent Public Comment process
 - DEQ provides draft final 401 cert.
 - EPA publishes final permit
 - DEQ provides final cert.



Current NPDES process in Idaho



 Also, DEQ performs 50 inspections/year & provides reports to EPA for final distribution

DEQ has NPDES certified inspectors

 EPA retains authority for enforcement





How DEQ is proceeding

- Preparing application for a Sept 2016 submittal
- Anticipate approval in 2018
- Phased implementation
 - 2018: Municipal permits
 - 2019: Industrial permits
 - 2020: General permits &
 Pretreatment
 - 2021: Storm water, biosolids,
 & federal facilities






Steps forward
